I don't recall the exact dates, but I have presented to council many times and led the creation of the City's Open Data Policy, Poet Laureate Program, and Digital Strategy, all of which were passed by council.

Mental health and addiction are healthcare issues and thus primarily the responsibility of the province. That being said, both have a significant impact on perceptions of public safety, which is the City's responsibility. The two levels of government must work together on this issue because the actions of one will affect the other. Another topic that must be addressed when discussing mental health and addiction is the availability of housing. Affordable housing, homelessness, mental health, addictions and public safety are frequently connected and need to be considered together when planning appropriate interventions.
