

Furthermore, the city should use the Mental Health and Addictions Strategy, approved in 2021, to guide collaborations and investments moving forward. Additionally, new developments do eventually need investments and infrastructure replacement. This comes at a significant cost if there is not enough of a taxbase present to shoulder the burden. Instead, we should be focusing on limiting our sprawl and, instead, investing in our inner-city communities where services, infrastructure, and space already exists. Smart growth also makes our transit system more effective, reduces our impacts on climate change, and increases the strength and vibrancy of our communities.

What role should the City of Calgary play, if any, in ensuring there is adequate, affordable starter housing stock, or rentals available for young Calgarians?

The City must shift its role from a gatekeeper of process to a partner in solutions. This means streamlining approvals, updating restrictive zoning to allow more "missing middle" housing, and using city-owned land for affordable projects. Our current processes often inflate costs and time; we must reform them to enable, not impede, the creation of attainable housing for young Calgarians. The addition of preapproved designs could also help streamline the development process and reduce overall costs.
